II Low Taxes

Georgia's tax system is widely regarded as one of the most appealing globally, offering individuals and businesses a particularly favorable setting in which to reside, operate, or invest. Georgia has established itself as a tax haven for expats, entrepreneurs, and corporations due to its simple structure, favorable tax rates, and exclusive advantages. The nation's tax policies facilitate both foreign and domestic investment, fostering a setting in which financial expansion is attainable and long-lasting.

No Tax on Foreign-Sourced Income

A key benefit of Georgia's tax regime for expats is the lack of taxes on foreign-sourced income. Individuals who earn their income overseas, whether through remote employment, freelancing, or investments, are exempt from taxation on these earnings within Georgia.

This advantage has made Georgia a favored location for digital nomads, remote professionals, and retirees who depend on global income sources.



Individual entrepreneur 1% tax

Georgia offers a distinctive opportunity for small businesses and self-employed individuals through its individual entrepreneur tax program. Registered individual entrepreneurs with an annual revenue below 500,000 GEL (~\$185,000) can take advantage of an exceptionally low tax rate of just 1% on their business income. This arrangement is particularly enticing for freelancers, consultants, and small business owners aiming to optimize their earnings.

Dividend 5% tax

For individuals receiving dividends from investments, Georgia presents a competitive tax rate of merely 5%, which is among the lowest in the area. This rate is applicable to both residents and non-residents, making Georgia the best option for investors aiming to reduce their tax liabilities on passive income.

Lower corporate tax

Georgia's corporate tax framework is another significant aspect, especially for businesses. The country utilizes a "tax on distributed profits" approach, meaning companies are taxed only on profits that are distributed as dividends, with a flat corporate tax rate of 15%. Retained earnings remain untaxed, promoting reinvestment and fostering business expansion.

Flat rate tax

Georgia's flat tax system simplifies the process of tax calculation and filing for individuals and businesses alike. Personal income tax is set at a uniform rate of 20%, ensuring a clear and transparent procedure. This system removes progressive tax brackets, making it particularly beneficial for high-income earners.

VAT

With a VAT of 18%, Georgia's rate is relatively standard yet lower than many European nations. Certain goods and services, including exports, enjoy VAT exemptions, further promoting trade and investment. What sets Georgia apart, however, is the range of exemptions that apply to specific goods and services, creating additional incentives for trade, investment, and business operations.

For example, exports are fully exempt from VAT, promoting Georgia's role as a key player in regional and international trade. Additionally, services provided to companies based abroad are also exempt from VAT. This means businesses offering IT, consulting, or other professional services to international clients can operate more profitably in Georgia by avoiding the typical VAT burden imposed in many other countries.



These exemptions significantly reduce operating costs, particularly for companies engaged in export-driven industries or remote services. Combined with Georgia's simplified tax structure and lack of restrictions on foreign business ownership, the VAT exemptions create a favorable environment for both local and foreign entrepreneurs seeking to establish or expand their operations in the country.

Georgia's low and transparent tax system is a key factor in its attractiveness to expats, business owners, and investors. The country offers a highly attractive environment for financial expansion due to no tax on foreign-earned income, low tax rates for self-employed individuals, and competitive corporate and dividend tax rates. Its simplified and user-friendly tax system, along with its strong economic prospects, makes Georgia an attractive location for individuals and companies aiming to succeed in a global economy.

III Business in Georgia

One of Georgia's key developments is its reputation as a highly business-friendly nation in its region, with a liberal economic system that features smooth regulations and a prime location providing access to both European and Asian marketplaces. In a business-friendly environment characterized by low taxes, simple administrative processes, and advantageous trade agreements, Georgia presents a highly attractive setting for entrepreneurs, small business operators, and major investors. Its spot in global ease-of-doing-business rankings makes it a preferred destination for those seeking to establish or grow their businesses.

Establishing a Business in Georgia

Registering a company in Georgia is relatively uncomplicated, allowing most businesses to finish the registration within a span of one to two business days. An efficient process minimizes the required paperwork; However, the process is intricate and detailed, during which an individual requires oversight and guidance from a professional. Georgia is an attractive choice for individuals prioritizing speed and efficiency. The National Agency of Public Registry (NAPR) is responsible for supervising the registration process, which involves the following steps:

- Selecting a business structure.
- Registering a business name online.
- Filing the required paperwork, which comprises the application, identification, and business location details, all of which can be prepared and taken care of for you.



In most cases, businesses are not obliged to meet a minimum capital requirement, thereby minimizing obstacles to starting up. Georgian nationals and foreigners have equal rights when it comes to establishing and managing enterprises, and foreign-owned companies are safeguarded by local legislation.

Entrepreneurs and investors are increasingly drawn to Georgia as a prime destination, since Georgia's business environment is characterized by low tax rates, strategic trade agreements, and a focus on simple administrative processes.

Why Georgia is Attracting Entrepreneurs and Investors

Low Taxes:

Georgia's tax code features a corporate tax rate of 15%, enabling businesses to retain earnings without paying taxes at all. Tax is only paid (15%) on profit that is distributed to its owners.

Small business owners can take advantage of a 1% tax on their revenue, provided they meet certain quite simple requirements.

Ease of conducting business operations:

The World Bank's Ease of Doing Business index consistently places Georgia among its top 10 countries, showcasing notable improvements in key areas like business start-ups, property registration, and tax compliance.

Access To Major Global Markets:

Georgia functions as a key transportation and commercial hub considering the country's location between Europe and Asia. The company's access to major global markets, including the EU, Turkey, China, Russia and Central Asia, positions it as a highly desirable location for businesses focused on exporting their products. Georgia enjoys preferential market access through free trade agreements with the European Union, specifically the Deep and Comprehensive Free Trade Agreement, as well as with China, Russia, Turkey, and members of the Commonwealth of Independent States (CIS).

Recruitment & Workforce Competency:

The labor market in Georgia is highly competitive and offers cost-effective options, with only limited regulations governing employee recruitment and dismissal. Georgia's workforce is comprised of well-educated individuals who speak multiple languages and is relatively cost-effective. A sizable number of Georgians are proficient in English, Russian, and local dialects, thereby facilitating the recruitment process for local businesses by reducing linguistic



obstacles. The nation possesses a strong pool of skilled professionals in fields like information technology, finance, travel and tourism, and agricultural production. Younger workers are frequently graduates of either international universities or local institutions with established global connections, which are accredited internationally. Salaries in Georgia are substantially lower than those found in Western Europe or North America, enabling businesses to hire a cost-effective workforce, which then allows your business to grow quicker. The average monthly wage in Georgia is roughly 1,600 GEL, equivalent to about \$600, but workers with advanced skills in various sectors could earn more. The estimated salary for a Salesperson for example, is GEL 501 per month in the Tbilisi Georgia area. The estimated total pay for an Accountant is GEL 2,500 per month in the Tbilisi Georgia area. A Waiter / Waitress working in Tbilisi will typically earn around GEL 1,000 per month. The estimated salary for a Chef is GEL 1,015 per month in the Tbilisi area. With these numbers & information in mind, you can accurately calculate the costs and effects of your business, we'll let you decide if it's worth it.

Types of Business

Limited Liability Company (LLC):

An LLC is a business entity that combines elements of both corporations and partnerships, or alternatively, of partnerships and sole proprietorships. The company is structured to give its owners, known as members, protection from personal liability while also offering flexibility in management and tax matters.

The key benefit of an LLC is the liability protection it provides to its owners. Generally, individuals' personal property like houses and cars is exempt from being seized to cover a company's financial liabilities or legal responsibilities, unless there is evidence of deceit or seriously illegal behavior. This safeguard has similarities to corporate protection, making it an appealing choice for numerous entrepreneurs.

One of the essential characteristics of an LLC is its system of taxation. By default, LLCs are subject to a corporate tax rate of 15%, which is only applied to distributed profits. This means that undistributed earnings retained within the company are not taxed, allowing businesses to reinvest in operations without immediate tax liabilities.

When profits are distributed to shareholders, they are subject to a 5% personal income tax, resulting in a combined effective tax rate of 20% on distributed income. This system eliminates the issue of double taxation often faced by corporations in other countries, where both the corporate income and individual dividends are taxed independently.

Moreover, taxation in Georgia for LLCs is based solely on distributed profit. Businesses that choose to reinvest their earnings rather than distribute them to shareholders can avoid taxation until such profits are eventually paid out. This unique feature of Georgia's tax system creates a



highly business-friendly environment, encouraging growth and reducing the immediate financial burden on companies.

Limited Liability Companies are also recognized for their adaptable management framework. Members can either oversee the company themselves (self-managed) or appoint individuals to handle day-to-day operations (externally managed), thus enabling owners to choose the approach that best suits their business needs. An LLC can have any number of members and several types, allowing for individuals, corporations, other LLCs, and even foreign entities to hold membership.

Limited liability companies provide numerous advantages, yet they also come with certain drawbacks. Potential investors may not favor businesses offering such ownership and management structures when securing venture capital, as they typically prefer those of corporations, particularly with regards to stock options and governance frameworks. Basically, if the intention is to have the shares of the company traded on a public stock exchange, then an LLC would not be the option for you, however, in more or less all other scenarios it is the obvious business form in Georgia.

Joint-Stock Company (JSC):

Capital business model with limited liability, along the same principles of an LLC, but far greater transparency and minimum capital requirements. This business model is more comparable to most European stock companies. Particularly the west and north European ones. The model requires a minimum capital of 100,000GEL and is generally equipped with a supervisory board consisting of at least 3 board members in addition to a director. In Georgia it is possible to operate a company through a monistic system which means that supervisory boards responsibilities in practical meaning will be divided instead by the company's general meeting (shareholders meeting) and the director. The company is obliged to work by an open book policy involving full publications of its financial statements on an annual basis, as well as stricter requirements and procedures for record-keeping, audits, written minutes from board meetings and general meetings on a regular basis.

The advantages of a JSC is that it is the only company form that can be publicly traded on the stock market and in-general large cooperations, particularly from: Europe, US, Japan, South-Korea, and several other countries, would be wary and hesitant to involve themselves in business relations with an LLC due to the lack of transparency, supervision, audits and regulatory oversight. In these aspects the JSC would be a far greater advantage for businesses intending to involve themselves with either large international cooperations, or companies who for other reasons want to promote stricter regulatory oversight and transparency.

It's important to mention that several fields of business that require a license and/or permit from the government would be required to be a JSC company. Such examples would be if you wanted to open a bank or other several types of institutions or organizations to operate within



certain fields of gambling, manufacturing of certain types of medical products, weapons, explosives or other types of regulated manufacturing involving the use of certain regulated chemicals.

Branch Office:

A branch office serves as an extension of its parent company, sharing the same legal identity and being entirely governed by the parent company. The entity does not constitute a distinct legal entity and instead serves as a regional or international representative for its parent organization. Many companies utilize branch offices to widen their geographical presence and enter fresh markets without having to form a separate subsidiary.

In Georgia, branch offices must comply with local registration regulations, yet they are viewed as a fundamental component of the parent organization. The parent company retains overall legal and financial accountability for the branch office's commitments and responsibilities. The branch office is subject to the corporate governance policies of its parent company, with its financial outcomes reported within the parent company's consolidated financial reports. Branch offices, unlike distinct entities, do not necessitate their own capital investment but do have to comply with local regulations related to taxation, reporting, and other operational matters.

A key benefit of establishing a branch office lies in its swift set-up process and its seamless operational link to the parent organization. This structure enables companies to utilize their existing reputation and resources in entering the new market. The branch office model is restricted in its ability to operate independently, as it requires approval from the parent company for substantial decision-making. The absence of legal distinction between the branch and its parent company results in direct liability transfer from the branch to the parent company, potentially exposing businesses operating in highly regulated or uncertain markets to significant risks.

Individual Entrepreneur (IE)

An individual entrepreneur (IE), on the other hand, is a person who conducts business activities independently without forming a separate legal entity. This is one of the simplest and most accessible business models for individuals looking to start small-scale operations, such as freelancers, consultants, or small shop owners. In Georgia, registering as an IE requires minimal formalities, such as submitting basic information to the relevant tax authorities. This business model allows entrepreneurs to operate under their own name and simplifies taxation, as business income is typically reported as personal income.

The Individual Entrepreneur (IE) model in Georgia is an attractive option for freelancers, digital nomads, and small business owners seeking a simple and cost-effective way to operate. One of its standout features is the **1% tax rate** on income up to a certain threshold (currently



500,000 GEL annually), making it an ideal choice for those providing services both to Georgian and international clients. This exceptionally low tax rate enables entrepreneurs to maximize their earnings while maintaining minimal administrative overhead.

Setting up as an IE is straightforward, requiring minimal paperwork and offering flexibility to operate independently. It's particularly suited to professionals offering services like IT consulting, graphic design, marketing, and other expertise-driven industries. For those selling services to foreign companies, the tax benefits are even more pronounced, as Georgia's system encourages global entrepreneurship.

The IE model is perfect for anyone looking to streamline their business operations without getting bogged down by complex regulations or high taxes. Whether you're a digital nomad working with international clients or a professional targeting local and global markets, Georgia's IE framework offers the simplicity and financial advantages needed to thrive.

Ride-hailing services such as Bolt are also accessible, with short trips costing approximately \$4 to \$5, which proves advantageous for occasional outings or when public transit is not readily available.

Private clinics and hospitals are comprehensively equipped, featuring modern technology and English-speaking professionals who address the needs of the international populace. Establishments such as MediClubGeorgia and Aversi Clinic in Tbilisi are favored by expats due to their quality of care and extensive range of services, encompassing general medicine, dentistry, and specialized consultations. Routine appointments at private clinics are considered affordable by international standards, with consultation fees generally ranging from \$20 to \$50, and specialized care costs varying from \$50 to \$100.

A notable advantage of residing in Georgia is the affordability of healthcare, even within private establishments. For expats, acquiring health insurance is advisable, as it facilitates access to private care while ensuring costs remain manageable. Local health insurance plans are obtainable through providers such as Ardi and TBC Insurance, with monthly premiums varying from \$20 to \$100 based on the extent of coverage. Furthermore, international health insurance policies are broadly accepted in private clinics, providing flexibility for individuals who travel frequently or require comprehensive coverage.

Pharmacies in Georgia are abundant and well-supplied, dispensing both prescription and over-the-counter medications. Pharmacists are generally well-informed and can assist with minor



medical issues, although prescriptions are mandatory for certain medications. Expats will discover that numerous international brands and generic alternatives are available at competitive prices. Most of the medicaments are available over the counter, without a necessary prescription.

In case of emergencies, Georgia maintains an ambulance service that is complimentary for Georgian citizens and accessible to expats at a nominal cost, Zero. Emergency response times are improving, particularly in urban areas; however, they may be prolonged in rural regions. Expats are encouraged to familiarize themselves with the nearest private hospitals and clinics, as these facilities are often better equipped to manage medical emergencies. Additionally, it is prudent to have a list of emergency contacts, including the numbers for ambulance services (112) and private clinics, readily available.

Instances of petty crime, such as pickpocketing, are infrequent, even in bustling urban centers like Tbilisi. This esteemed reputation for safety renders Georgia particularly attractive for families and solo travelers in pursuit of a secure setting.

The Georgian government has made substantial investments in enhancing public safety over the preceding two decades, featuring a visible presence of law enforcement in urban locales and tourist attractions. Police officers are typically approachable and accommodating, albeit with varying degrees of English proficiency. Expats are advised to reach out to the police (by dialing 112) should any safety issues or emergencies arise.

Emergency services in Georgia, encompassing fire and ambulance responses, are Simple through the centralized 112 hotline, which operates in several languages, including English. This centralized framework guarantees that callers are efficiently directed to the appropriate services. Nonetheless, response times may fluctuate, especially in rural or remote regions where infrastructure is less developed. Expats residing outside major urban areas are urged to exercise additional caution, including maintaining a comprehensive first-aid kit and identifying local resources for medical assistance and security.

Although Georgia is predominantly safe, there exist several precautions that expats ought to contemplate. One area of concern is traffic safety, as driving standards in Georgia may prove to be unpredictable. Although earthquakes are rare, it is imperative to be cognizant of fundamental earthquake safety protocols, particularly for those residing in seismically active regions. Expats should familiarize themselves with emergency evacuation routes and ensure their residences are stocked with essential supplies, such as water, flashlights, and non-perishable food items.

Cybersecurity and online safety constitute additional considerations for expats, particularly those engaged in remote work. While Georgia's digital infrastructure is robust, it is advisable to adopt fundamental precautions—such as utilizing secure Wi-Fi networks, enabling two-factor authentication, and refraining from clicking on suspicious links—to mitigate online threats.

Digital Nomad Visa

In response to the needs of remote workers and freelancers, Georgia has launched specialized programs. The “Remotely from Georgia” initiative, established during the COVID-19 pandemic, was strategically developed to attract digital nomads and remote professionals. Although the initial enthusiasm for the program has diminished as global restrictions have relaxed, it represented the commencement of Georgia’s deliberate efforts to support the expanding digital nomad demographic.

This initiative permitted individuals earning a minimum of \$2,000 per month to reside and work remotely in Georgia for a duration of up to one year, granting access to essential local services such as banking and healthcare. While this program was distinct from conventional residency permits, its framework underscored Georgia’s dedication to cultivating a conducive environment for remote workers. Expats contemplating extended stays can transition from such programs into formal residency alternatives, particularly those designed for freelancers and entrepreneurs.

Types of Residency Permits

Georgia provides an array of residency permits tailored to various purposes and individual circumstances. These permits ensure legal security, facilitate access to services, and create opportunities for long-term integration into Georgian society.

Residency:

Residency is generally granted for employment, family reunification, or other temporary requirements. It remains valid for a maximum of six years, with the possibility of renewal.

Investment-Based Residency:

This category of residency is awarded to individuals who make a substantial investment in Georgia, typically through real estate or business endeavors.



Special Residency Permits:

These permits are conferred upon individuals with a distinctive connection to Georgia, such as those of Georgian descent or those who have made significant contributions to the nation's development. Each permit possesses unique eligibility criteria and benefits, making it imperative for applicants to thoroughly assess which type aligns best with their long-term aspirations.



The train voyage from Tbilisi to Baku, the capital of Azerbaijan, spans approximately 12 hours, providing a comfortable overnight experience. Baku's UNESCO World Heritage-listed Old City, set against the backdrop of the avant-garde Flame Towers, invites an intriguing examination of the nation's cultural and architectural diversity. Beyond Baku, Gobustan National Park and its mud volcanoes present unique opportunities for day trips that highlight Azerbaijan's natural and historical marvels.

Turkey, located to the southwest of Georgia, emerges as another favored destination for travelers. The land border at Sarpi, in proximity to Batumi, facilitates seamless access to Turkey's Black Sea coastline. Cities such as Trabzon and Rize showcase a synthesis of Turkish and Georgian influences, encompassing traditional tea culture and the shared architectural heritage of medieval monasteries. For those desiring broader exploration, direct flights from



Tbilisi to Istanbul grant entry into Turkey's cultural and historical epicenter, while additional flight connections provide pathways to destinations such as Cappadocia and Antalya.

Georgia's closeness to Europe, the Middle East, and Central Asia enhances the allure of international travel. Budget airlines operating from Kutaisi International Airport furnish economical connections to cities such as Warsaw, Berlin, and Tel Aviv, thereby enabling travelers to navigate the broader region with minimal financial burden.

The journey guides travelers through ancient hamlets, where time-honored traditions persist, providing insights into a lifestyle that is both resilient and profoundly intertwined with the natural environment.
